STORM-RELIEF FUND-RAISING

Tropical Storm Irene passed through in late August, causing devastating damage across central and southern Vermont. While many areas in Pittsford were adversely impacted by this historic storm, the Town was fortunate to have emerged with relatively little damage. For example, our covered bridges are still standing tall.

While Pittsford was lucky, its residents are mindful of the plight of those in nearby towns who were hit so hard. Pittsford wants to help and Pittsford will help. A Committee of civic and business leaders has been formed to lead fund-raising efforts to help those in need in neighboring towns. Many events will take place over the next several weeks through which folks can help. For example, there will be contribution buckets at checkout counters in Town stores, bottle drives, car washes, coin drops, a disc-golf tournament (Recreation Area, Saturday, October 22 with a 9:00 AM shotgun start) and other events. The Fire Department will be designating a portion of the proceeds from the upcoming Haunted House event (October 21,22, 28 and 29) to the cause. There will also be a contribution box at the Town Clerk's Office.

Cash is welcome. Checks should be made payable to the Pittsford Fire Department with the memo line reading "Irene Recovery Fund." All funds raised will be distributed directly to people from nearby towns identified as having suffered particularly badly as the result of the storm and its aftermath. Thank you!

LOTHROP SCHOOL NEWS



Over the summer, **Lothrop**

continued to make building improvements including exterior lighting, new flooring in the lower level and more energy efficient lighting in many classrooms. Many of these improvements were funded by various grants. Also, a wireless internet system was installed throughout the building.

Students started back to school on September 6th due to damaged road conditions caused by Hurricane Irene. Thanks to the behind the scenes work of Becky Congdon, Transportation Coordinator for RNESU, the back-to-school transition seemed effortless. Thanks also to the road crew workers, bus drivers, teachers and staff for their collaborative effort to make the beginning of school an easy transition for students. Teachers and staff at Lothrop are continuing to see results with the collaborative Professional Learning Community model, and throughout the year, the school will be introducing an anti-bullying campaign that has been implemented elsewhere in the supervisory union.

CAVERLY NEWS

Our youngest students, some of them attending school for the first time, are getting off to a great start at **Caverly Preschool** which participates in Vermont's Step Ahead Recognition Program (**STARS**), the state's quality recognition system for childcare, preschool and afterschool programs. Caverly also offers special education services such as speech/language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy and basic skill instruction to eligible children. Recently, **Caverly was awarded** the top rating of five-stars, indicating outstanding ratings in all of the STARS quality indicators: licensing standards, curriculum and activities, training and education, families and communities, and business practices. Congratulations to the staff on this achievement.

SEWER SYSTEM UPGRADE PROJECT

You may have noticed work come to a standstill on Arch Street. Our Contractor, the Belden Company, was called away to help with emergency work on Route 4 in Mendon where they helped restore the road and repair the Alpine Pipeline which carries sewage down the mountain. We expect work to resume on Arch Street during the week of September 26.

PITTSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Select Board has approved the conversion of the Constabulary into a Police Department. The change will generally not affect operations but will enable the Town to seek grant funding not otherwise available.

Fire Hydrants Save Lives...



...They also can save homeowners money. One added benefit of the recently-completed water upgrade project is the increased number of fire hydrants with sufficient flows to tackle fires. Town residents with hydrants installed closer to their homes during the course of the water project would be wise to notify their homeowner's insurance carriers. There may be a substantial reduction in premium payments for homes with improved fire protection available. Be sure to keep fire hydrants free from snow by reminding snow removal contractors not to block the hydrants when they are plowing.

Chittenden residents can now use the Food Shelf. When St Roberts Church in Chittenden sold, a stipend was designated to go to the Food Shelf with the understanding that we would accept Chittenden residents. To me, this makes sense as many residents of Chittenden have either a Pittsford phone number or address or donate to us on a regular basis. So to Chittenden WELCOME.

Reminder that in order to use the Food Shelf you MUST be a resident of Pittsford, Proctor, Florence or Chittenden and show proof of residency with a utility bill. Effective October 1, 2011 EVERYONE must recertify. We are going into a new fiscal year.

Thanksgiving Baskets will be done the first 2 weeks of November by appointment then closed the last 2 weeks so the volunteers can have time with their families for the holidays. Same for December – Christmas Baskets, will be the first 2 weeks of December and closed the last 2 weeks. Clients will be contacted for appointments. If you know someone who has a need for the holidays, please give Robin a call at 483-2967.

Recently chainsaw work was required on Chaffee Falls, Split Rock, Bald Peak, Recreation Center and High Meadows trails. All trails are open now, though some are soggy in low-lying areas.

PITTSFORD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Retired US Air Force Colonel Bill Gladski's Memorial Day address is now on our Web page, www.pittsfordhistorical.com, courtesy of videographer Ken Lizotte of Bristol, VT.

Among other visitors this summer, Elizabeth Freeman and siblings brought their 90-year old mother to Eaton Hall to find records of her great-grandfather, Dr. George B. Armington (1801-1863), who came to Pittsford in 1831. His patients "found him both faithful and skilled." He lived in Ruth Wimett's late home in the Village. Liz Freeman is treasurer of the New Ipswich, NH Historical Society.

Besides numerous cash donations, recent gifts include a 1985 map of Rutland County from Lois Blittersdorf. Also a complete set of bound Town Reports covering the 20th and late 19th centuries from Ruth and Alice Wimett's estates as well as more documents from Ruth Hennessey's estate. We received word that native son and long-time member James J. McCullough's family genealogy and photo album will soon be added to our collections. At age 93, Jim died last March, the son of John and Ruth (Walker) McCullough. He was a US Navy World War II submariner and for over 50 years a respected antiques dealer and appraiser, and co-founder of the Shrewsbury Historical Society.

Author Patrick E. O'Brian came from Virginia on Aug. 28 to autograph his novel about boyhood summers spent on his grandfather Alex Paul's farm on Elm Street. The story is told by a 6-year-old boy growing into manhood. But tropical storm Irene rained and blew through Town that day, postponing until September 11 our Open House and the festivities marking Lothrop School's 100th anniversary. So O'Brian left us signed books to sell at the Museum for \$14.00 each.

On Sept. 11, Betty Atwood demonstrated weaving on her antique loom for an interested crowd. The Lothrop student History Club performed a short skit about school benefactor Henry Lothrop, and wrote the parts for mentors Melanie Clerihew and Jan Ryan as two Pittsford ladies on their way to the 1911 parade before laying the school's cornerstone. Club members also taught kids old-time games. Ernie Clerihew gave rides around the Village Green in his newly restored 1914 Model T Ford during our September 18 meeting and potluck supper.

Our annual meeting on Sunday, October 16 will begin with a potluck supper before celebrating the 250th anniversary of Pittsford's charter, signed in 1761 by NH Royal Gov. Benning Wentworth. The Clerihews plan to have on view their photos of Wentworth's two homes in Portsmouth, NH, taken just in time for this program.

The Museum will close for the winter in mid-November. However, we check our phone messages regularly (802 483-2040) and will meet researchers by appointment, weather permitting. Regular Tuesday hours from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. will resume in late March or early April, 2012.
