PITTSFORD TOWN -WIDE YARD SALE

WATER PROJECT

The water system upgrade is nearly complete. There will be several new water service lines run underneath Route 7 in the Village this Spring and the Town is working with its project engineer to put any remaining contingency funds (grant funding) to good use on water system upgrades. The next utility bills will be mailed out in the latter half of July and will reflect a full six months of usage data.

SEWER PROJECT

With USDA loan and grant funding in place, work is nearing completion on Phase 1 of the upgrade project (Wastewater Treatment Facility). Phase 2 of the project, which involves replacement of sewer lines on Arch, Mechanic and Pleasant Streets and the replacement of the Elm Street pump station will soon begin. The current plan involves reconstruction and temporary paving of these roads in the Fall of this year and a more permanent paving job in the Spring of 2012. As culvert work will also be done, there may be occasions where brief road closures are necessary. We hope that folks in the affected areas will continue to show patience as this important work is done.

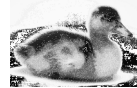

POMAINVILLE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA

About 3 miles north of the Pittsford Town center, on the west side of Route 7, lies a real gem, the Pomainville Wildlife Management Area. The Rutland County Audubon Society has been monitoring this area on a monthly basis for the past two years. It is best visited late April – early July and is frequently flooded, so tall waterproof boots are needed. Bobolinks, with their ebullient song, nest in the grasses, and Marsh Wrens and Savannah Sparrows can be heard and frequently spotted. American Bittern, Virginia Rail, Wilson’s Snipe, Wood Duck, and Green Heron are among the birds that have been found in the marshy, wetland areas. In the trees along the Otter Creek, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers and Yellow-throated Vireos have nested. LeConte’s and Nelson’s Sparrow have been sighted during fall migration. And not to be outdone, raptor species seen include Northern Harrier, Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, and American Kestrel. For anyone interested in doing some great bird watching, this is the place to be.



LISTERS' REPORT

The Homestead Declaration is no longer required to be filed annually unless property is bought or sold. Property bought or sold requires a filing or withdrawal within 30 days or a penalty is assessed. The Property Tax Adjustment Claim (Form HS-145) must be filed annually. See the instructions on pages 44-45 of the Vermont Tax Booklet.

When building, removing or changing the use of structures on your property, a permit is required from the Zoning Office. We also suggest that all property owners pick up a copy of the “Listers Card” for their property and review it for accuracy if this has not been done recently, especially if changes have been made.

The Listers office is open Monday – Thursday from 9:00 – 1:00pm. or call 483-6500 ex. 15.

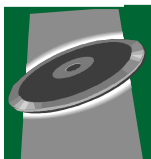

DISC GOLF

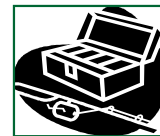

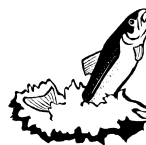

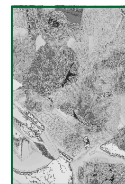

Crime Not to Read

We have begun a new program in collaboration with the Vermont State Police and Lothrop Elementary School. The project, called "It's a Crime Not to Read," is based on a program that originated in Calgary, Canada after a public librarian learned about a strong correlation between the expected number of future prison cells and present-day second grade reading levels.

The goal of "It's a Crime Not to Read" is to connect second grade students with books, reading, life-long learning, and positive community relationships with police officers. Each month, Maclure Library staff and Trooper Stephanie Shaw visit Lothrop's 2nd grade class and read aloud to the students. The program provides the students with positive role models who read for pleasure, a favorable image of police officers, and promotes reading and increased library awareness. Students will receive a copy of the book read that month and a special library card to reinforce the importance of using library resources.

Food Matters

The last screening in a series of programs from TEDTalks about food: growing it, cooking it, consuming it -- and making sure there's enough for all. These talks examine big ideas through the food we eat. Two 15-minute programs each night followed by an open discussion.

Tuesday, May 10 at 7:00 p.m.

Our first program of the evening is *A Plant's-eye View*. Author Michael Pollan asks us to see the world from a plant's-eye view. Michael Pollan is the author of *The Omnivore's Dilemma*, in which he explains how our food not only affects our health but also has far-reaching political, economic, and environmental implications.

Our second program is *One Seed at a Time, Protecting the Future of Food*. Biodiversity warrior Cary Fowler wants to save the world from agricultural collapse, one seed at a time, because the varieties of wheat, corn and rice we grow today may not thrive in a future threatened by climate change. Fowler takes us inside a seed bank that stores a diverse group of food-crop for whatever tomorrow may bring.
