Disc golf takes flight in Pittsford

PITTSFORD — The Pittsford Recreation Area is a gem. It is in a majestic setting enveloped by woods. It boasts baseball and softball diamonds, a swimming pool, a basketball court, a volleyball court, food concession and a gorgeous network of trails for walking or hiking.

But what gets as much use as anything and really sets this facility apart from others in small towns is an 18-hole disc golf course that is free to play as long as you bring your own discs.

You can rent discs for \$5 each.

It was the concern of Recreation Director Randy Adams that the layout might detract from the area's other offerings or get in the way of them, but he has been pleased that has not been the case. The course is almost entirely cut through the woods, not interfering with any other activity while giving the disc golfers a pleasant venue with plenty of cover during hot days.

The course design was by residents Terry Poor and Tony Freson.

Adams said Poor and Freson are fervid disc golfers who were traveling all the way to Barre to play before laying out the course in their community.

"They came to us and presented the ideas," Adams said.

"It's really our most popular activity."

And why not. It's free. It's a walk through the woods. And it's an activity offering some competition if you choose to play against others.

Or you can simply play the course as Mendon's Dave Lewis did on a recent weekday morning. Lewis came with a bag slung over his shoulder holding his own discs.

Lewis said the sport has the same things attached to it the game of regular golf does.

"It's frustrating. It's definitely golf," he said.

There is another similarity between disc golf and regular golf: Addiction.

You can become obsessed with trying to lower your score or beat your partner.

"But it's a lot cheaper than golf," Lewis said.

Both games boast the same sets of strategies and skills. Lewis had a handful

of disks as he tried to execute a fade to avoid a tree in order to set himself up for a great second shot on a par 3 hole — the only hole of the 18 that is not really in the woods.

The course plays 5,027 feet from the white tees and 3,219 from the red tees. Par is 60.

Rutland. You can walk or bike point-to-point, playing disc golf along the way.

There is no league for disc golf at the Pittsford layout, but Adams believes it would not be difficult to start one.

Lewis plays in a league at one of the two courses in Killington.

There are a couple of tournaments played at the Pittsford course. One is a fund raiser for the library and Adams runs another in the fall to benefit the recreation department.
